

## GENERAL INFORMATION

### LOCATION

The 1994 Eighteenth Annual Conference will meet in Dallas, Texas. The Conference Hotel is the Doubletree Hotel at Lincoln Center, 5410 LBJ Freeway, Dallas, Texas 75240. The hotel telephone number is 214-934-8400 and fax is 214-701-5244. Rooms are available at the conference rate of \$74 single and double, plus applicable taxes. It is not possible to obtain the GSA rate through the Doubletree 800 number. In order to receive the reduced conference rate, it is necessary to identify yourself as attending the Conference of the German Studies Association. The hotel will guarantee these rates until September 14, 1994. Therefore, it is important to make reservations early! The Association's block of rooms will be released on that date.

#### How to get to the hotel:

The Doubletree Hotel at Lincoln Center is located at the intersection of I-635 (LBJ Freeway) and the Dallas Tollway in North Dallas, across from the famous Galleria Shopping Center. The hotel is approximately 20 minutes from Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport and 15 minutes from Love Field.

From Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport, the hotel is served by "Discount Shuttle", which runs every 10 minutes. Go to the lower (underground) level of your arrival terminal and wait for the orange Discount Shuttle at the "Shared Ride" sign; the cost will be \$12 per person, and the Doubletree Hotel at Lincoln Center will generally be the first hotel the shuttle stops at. Be sure to specify the Doubletree at Lincoln Center, as there are two other Doubletree hotels in Dallas. A taxi directly from Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport to the hotel will cost approximately \$25.00. From Love Field, take a taxi directly to the hotel; cost will be approximately \$12.00.

### IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ALL INTERNATIONAL PARTICIPANTS!

The United States is **not** a member of the European Banking Consortium. Eurocheques are **not** accepted by American banks or by hotels, restaurants, shops, etc. Some banks will make an exception, sometimes for a fee. Rates vary. If you must convert a Eurocheque, write it out in Deutsche Marks, not U.S. Dollars. The European banks do not recognize Eurocheques in dollars! Thus, an American bank may accept a Eurocheque for conversion at the dollar-mark rate with or without a fee or may decline to accept it at all. If it is written in dollars, expect a fee of up to 40%. Experienced European travellers bring traveller's checks (available in any European bank. Either dollar or DM traveller's checks are generally accepted by banks. Traveller's checks in dollars are accepted by hotels, restaurants, and shops. Credit cards are another good way to pay. They are widely used in the United States. The most popular are MasterCard, Visa, and Eurocard (which is MasterCard). Less popular are Diner's Club and American Express.

## REGISTRATION INFORMATION

### Pre-registration by Mail

Pre-registration at the reduced rate is available for members of the Association whose membership was in good standing as of July 1, 1994. **Persons who join the Association after that date pay the non-member rate.** A registration form is enclosed with this program and should be used to facilitate registration by mailing it before the deadline. Pre-registrants may pick up their registration packet at the GSA Registration Desk. Pre-registration for members as of July 1, 1994 is \$35. Regular registration, after pre-registration has closed, is available for members as of July 1 at the rate of \$45. Pre-registration for non-members and those who joined the Association after July 1, 1994 is \$50, and regular registration for non-members and those who joined after July 1, 1994 is \$55. Pre-registration for the conference is available with the form in this program until September 20, 1994.
